DAY 1: ANCHORAGE & WASILLA: Today starts the first day of your Alaska Adventure by exploring the history of our state! Your guide will meet you out front of the lobby of one of our two pick-up points at 11:00 AM. You'll recognize our executive-mini coaches by the unique gold and black Alaska Adventure Unlimited branding. We will have a luggage trailer provided.







NATIVE HISTORY:** Travel across town to the spectacular Native Heritage Center, a renowned cultural center and museum, where all people can come to expand their understanding & appreciation of Alaska's first people. Here, you will share the rich heritage of Alaska's eleven cultural groups drawing upon the life ways of long ago, the wisdom of our elders, and the traditions that endure. The Welcome House is a celebration of contemporary Alaska Native cultures while the outdoor facilities and sites allow the exploration of ancient tradition and the presentation of stories from the past. Upon leaving the Anchorage area, we will travel north to the Matanuska Valley, the farming belt of Alaska. Along the way, we will visit the native village of Eklutna. Enjoy the Russian Orthodox influenced Chapel and native influenced "spirit houses", while sharing in their cultural traditions.

ACCOMMODATIONS IN WASILLA

DAY 2: PALMER:

HATCHER PASS GOLD PANNING: Soak in the beautiful scenery of Hatcher Pass & Independence Gold Mine built in the early 1900's. Try your hand at gold panning! We bring our own gold pans and have fun trying to "strike it rich!" A park naturalist is often available to share the history of the mine, as well as flora & fauna of the area. Hatcher Pass is a favorite of guests, for its beauty, wildflowers, berries and wildlife The best photography here is in later summer when pass comes alive with changes in color!





KNIK GLACIER BOAT TOUR: Your adventure will take you aboard a river boat to Lake George, the base of Knik Glacier: one of Alaska's grandest natural attractions. Knik Glacier, born in the Pleistocene Glaciation period (the beginning of the Ice Age) 600,000 years ago, covered the Anchorage bowl and the entire Cook Inlet. While it remains active, with motion imperceptible to the naked eye, this glacier is in a constant state of change.

DAY 3: TALKEETNA: Start the morning off at the Iditarod Headquarters and learn all about the Last Great Race on Earth! Have a chance to meet an Iditarod musher with his dog team and share in the thrill of the race, as you take a mini-ride on a summer dog sled buggy around a quarter-acre track (\$10 pp). Pet the newly born puppies or enjoy a brief 20-minute film about the race, highlighting the life of a musher, and his relationship with his dogs.

Next, it's off to visit the home of Mt. Denali. Today will present one of many highlights of your adventure. Talkeetna is a local gem where three Alaskan rivers meet, one of the most photographed vistas in our state can be seen: the towering peaks of Denali & the Alaska mountain range. On this day, you'll be able to choose **ONE** of the following adventures to enjoy in

UPGRADE (\$150 per person): Half-Day Fishing: Home to a variety of fish species in South Central Alaska. River fishing offers you a chance to experience Alaska fishing at its best! All fishing gear provided.



Later this afternoon, continue the adventure to Denali National Park, stop at South Denali View for spectacular photo ops and a chance to stretch your legs. Then on to Denali, cross over Hurricane Gulch, and soak in the breathtaking vistas. Upon arrival in Denali National Park, this evening allows for a dinner stop in "Glitter Gulch", the area just outside the park entrance.







Option 1: Denali Shuttle - RELAXED

Your chance to spot wildlife & soak in the wilderness from the Denali State Shuttle. Your guide will escort you to the Wilderness Access Center where you'll embark on the Denali Park Shuttle. The shuttle takes you deep into the park for a five-hour roundtrip tour, including stops. Keep your eyes peeled for a chance to see the Big 5: moose, Dall Sheep, caribou, wolves, and grizzly bears.






Upgrade Option 2: Self-Guided 4-Hour Savage River Ebike Ride- \$105 Per Person - STRENUOUS Leave right from Bike Denali and pedal yourself into the park. Experience the front country of Denali and go to Savage River. Navigate the steep terrain in undeveloped wilderness. E-bikes come with racks, panniers, bear spray with handlebar mount, and quality rain suits. E-bike experience recommended.

Option 3: Self-guided Hike - MODERATE

Adventure on your own in the park. Our recommendation is the 2.1-mile loop around Horseshoe Lake. You will have views of the Nenana River & Glitter Gulch at the farthest end of the loop trail. There are multiple benches along the hike to relax and take in the views. There is a moderate climb back up to meet your guide but the scenery is unbeatable. Your guide can facilitate other hiking options.

Afternoon Activity Upgrade: White-Water Raft - \$140 Per Person

Upgrade to an afternoon activity. On the Canyon Wave Raft Tour, you'll journey through 11 miles of a glacial river with spectacular views of Denali National Park gems. Raft into the gorge running rapids with names like Razorback, Train Wreck and Coffee Grinder. Most rapids are Class 3 with a couple Class 4 rapids Join the team as a Paddle Rafter or play it cool and just ride as an Oar Boat Rider. Must be 12+ years or older.



DAY 06 | DENALI: Today is a day of leisure. There are many things to experience in and around Denali National Park. Guests may enjoy the scenery and activities provided at their accommodations (some accommodations provide kayaks). There are also various hiking options in and around Denali National Park. In addition, Denali National Park Visitor Center offers many activities such as exhibits, movies, dog kennel tours, etc.

3) Denali Zip Line: 3 hours \$179 Per Person

Start with a three-mile ATV trail ride to your launching point through the scenic Alaskan wilderness. After gearing up, certified guides will lead you along six sky bridges and seven thrilling zip lines. Over half a mile of zips including the dual racer finale!



4) Fat Truck Tour: 2.5 hours \$229 Per Person

Travel up an old mining trail to the "upper lookout" where you will see vista views and learn about the geology and history of the area. Test out the amphibious qualities of the truck with your guide! One departure only - Limited to 6 people.

DAY 7: PALMER & GLACIER VIEW: Get ready for your choice of adventure from mild to wild as you get to choose from one of three activities on 360 acres of private Alaskan wilderness at a working ranch in Palmer.

1) MORNING ACTIVITY CHOICE:



ZIPLINE ADVENTURE

Alaska's first and only all-tandem zipline course. You will see incredible views as you soar side by side across the Wolverine Creek and Canyon. Your guide will take you along 6 zips and 3 suspension bridges. Some zips are 255ft' high and 1,250 ft long.



HOMESTEAD RANCH TOUR

Learn about the history of the Sunderland Ranch and other original farms in Lazy Mountain. We will walk about a mile to see incredible views and other unique points of interest. One of our touring rigs will pick us up to visit the horse barn.



HORSEBACK RIDING

Stunning trails will take you around the ranch and up to some incredible views of the Chugach Range while riding the foothills of Lazy Mountain.

GLACIER TREK: The second half of your day takes you north to Glacier View. the Matanuska River winds its way beside you, revealing stunning views of mountains, valleys, and glaciers. A quick lunch stop at one of our favorite local lodges gives you the chance to try some delicious Alaskan cuisine. After lunch, discover the true beauty of glaciers up close. Ice crampons and helmets are provided for your glacier trek adventure. You will follow your guide as you walk and explore the ice & rock formations of the Matanuska Glacier. No experience is necessary for this glacier trek. Intermittently placed picnic benches allow guests to choose their own participation level & soak in the beauty. (*HELICOPTER GLACIER LANDING UPGRADE AVAILABLE/\$269 per person)

ACCOMMODATIONS IN GLACIER VIEW

DAY 8: COPPER CENTER TO KENNICOTT: This morning, breakfast is available for purchase before you begin the scenic drive to Copper Center, the home of the Copper River Red's (salmon). Pass by Tazlina Glacier, the most scenic vantage points in the state, and Eureka Summit, home to the Alaskan hunter of caribou & moose.

McCARTHY / KENNICOTT: A quick stop at the Wrangell-St. Elias National Park Visitors Center, allows you to learn about the largest National Park in both Alaska and Canada. Next, a ride to the Old Historic Copper Center, you will enjoy a step back in time. Visit the old museum, highlighting life at the turn of the century, deep in the wilderness of Alaska. Learn about the Copper Strike, opening the whole valley up to civilization. Enjoy a stop for lunch at "Nummies" a local favorite mom & pop restaurant. (Meal not included). After a scenic drive along the Klutina River, enjoy a stop at Liberty Falls for a rest stop and photo opportunity. Then get ready to board a small plane for an exciting flightseeing tour over the Wrangell St. Elias National Park. Six times the size of Yellowstone, Wrangell-St. Elias National Park encompasses 20,000 square miles of mountain wilderness. It includes nine of the sixteen highest peaks in the US, the largest concentration of mountains over 14,000 feet in North America. This flight will amaze you with views that rival those in Denali!





Upon arriving in McCarthy, the lore and history of this remote town will captivate you. The old railroad bed has been graded with gravel and is one of only two roads in this remote area. You can alternately walk the town on your own, discovering mineral filled rocks, creek beds & more. This evening, "family style" dinner is a fresh choice of locally grown salad fixings, and gourmet foods, all served in the dining room of the Kennicott Glacier Lodge. (This meal is not included.) Here you can relax, read, play a family game, or take a walk. Evenings usually bring a presentation by one of the local activity vendors highlighting glacier hikes available the next day. Overnight in rooms that will take you back in time, an escape into Alaska's past with antiques, clippings of old newspapers and magazines, and relics from days gone by.

DAY 9: MCCARTHY TO VALDEZ: This morning is a day at leisure to enjoy one of many activities highlighted at the previous evening's presentation. A breakfast is available for purchase in the main dining room. Next, you can walk on a gravel roadway out to root glacier at your leisure, so you can stop along the way for photo opportunities. This is a distance, so take your time and enjoy a slow pace. Or enjoy a leisure walk around the copper mill area. Look for the rocks, brightly colored with blue azurite, green copper and white quartz. You can choose to participate in an optional Kennicott Town & Mill Tour and hear of the history of the ore mining operations between 1910–1938. The Kennicott Mine produced and milled 200 million dollars' worth of copper ore, copper & silver.

Housed in Kennecott's historic train depot, the Kennecott Visitor Center is your information hub for the Kennecott Mines National Historic Landmark in the heart of Wrangell-St. Elias National Park and Preserve. Pick up maps and brochures, join a ranger for a history talk or nature walk. The visitor center also hosts a small branch of the Alaska Geographic's bookstore.

At 12 PM, enjoy a drive down to the VERY small town of McCarthy. McCarthy bloomed as the service town for Kennicott. Hotels, stores, pool halls and other "entertainment" made up the bustling Alaskan town. At its peak, McCarthy had around 500 buildings of which a handful still remain. When Kennicott ceased operation and the last train left in 1938, McCarthy slowly died. The area is now home to approximately 25 – 30 year-round residents and has become a popular destination for many travelers from around the world. Locals share the flare of living remote and small-town shops show off wares from local artists. Later this afternoon, enjoy another opportunity to flight see again on your return to Chitina. Your excursion continues through the Copper Basin with a stop to view a segment of the Alyeska Oil Pipeline. Next, Worthington Glacier is known as one of the most photographed glaciers due to its stunning surroundings, this glacier stop offers time to hike or sit and take in the surroundings.







VALDEZ: As we travel over Thompson Pass and then into Keystone Canyon, some of the most beautiful waterfalls in Alaska reveal themselves. Photo stops will offer time for even the novice to capture stunning vistas. This evening arriving in Valdez, after time to freshen up, "mosey" into the local on-site restaurant for dinner (meal not included) and a night of fun and laughter with a touch of local flare.

DAY 10: PRINCE WILLIAM SOUND BOAT CHARTER TO WHITTIER: This morning, enjoy a continental breakfast in the hotel restaurant or order a larger breakfast on your own. (Continental included) Having said good-bye to your AAU Guide, you will continue on with a fan-fare day cruise of the Prince William Sound. Cruising to Whittier, watch for marine life which could include several species of whales, sea otters, harbor seals, sea birds including kitty wakes, gulls, turns and more. Eagles soar overhead and occasionally share their nesting habits with us. Pass by glaciers named after the famous Ivy League East Coast Colleges, you will see why this is so aptly named College Fjord.






As you arrive in Whittier, this small fishing town is Alaska's newest port. Upon arrival in Whittier you will need to meet your private transfer to Seward by 6 PM. Enjoy the scenic drive through the 2-mile Anton Anderson Tunnel and stunning mountain views on your way down to the Kenai Peninsula. Accommodations have been reserved in Seward for two nights.

DAY II | SEWARD - KENAI FJORDS NATIONAL PARK DAY CRUISE: Kenai Fjords Wildlife and Glacier Cruise takes you deep into the heart of Kenai Fjords National Park, a place many marine and land-based wildlife call home.

Dog Sled Ride: (\$125 per person)

The intrigue of the Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race, also known as Alaska's Superbowl, comes alive as you mush through the Alaskan wilderness to the base of Resurrection Mountain and along Box Canyon Creek. You will have a guide with you while a team of Iditarod dogs pull you in a wheeled cart on a gravel road.

Tandem Sea Kayaking: (\$125 per person)

While you're charting the waters of beautiful Resurrection Bay, keep your eyes peeled for otters, salmon, and eagles. This adventure is great for all groups (big and small). Your three-hour guided kayaking tour will go to Tonsina Creek. Kayaking gear - rain jacket & rain pants, water, and snack provided. Dry bags available upon request. Tours depart rain or shine.

Lake Clark Bear Viewing - 6-8 Hour Bear Viewing: \$1,250 per person

Your Lake Clark National Park Bear Viewing Adventure begins when you depart Anchorage on a float plane and head south along the Cook Inlet. This ocean front setting is the ultimate bear habitat. The creek running through is loaded with Silver Salmon, attracting a resident Brown Bear population to the area all summer long. The flight in itself offers a spectacular flightseeing tour; this scenic route takes you by 3 active volcanoes, numerous salmon streams, glaciers, and other Alaskan sights. The Lake Clark Bear Viewing begins after a brief bear orientation aimed at group safety. You & your pilot will head out into this ideal bear habitat to watch these creatures interact with each other in the wild. The area is excellent for viewing the bears because of the layout and geography; it is a long stretch of grassland and beachfront. Watch as they frolic in the grass with their cubs, dig for clams, and take afternoon naps.

- Mobility Impaired: This tour requires a moderate amount of walking on uneven terrain (approximately 1-2 miles) If you are
 concerned about you or someone in your party's ability to do so, please contact our office to review the options.
- What to Bring and Wear: Footwear Rubber or waterproof boots. If you do not have any boots, Regal will provide you with a
 pair. Camera, binoculars If you do not have any you may share some with the bear guide.
- Layered Clothing Always be ready for any temperature range, bring a rain shell in case of rain

Flight departs Anchorage at 9 AM and returns to Anchorage at 3:30 PM - 6.5 hours total (4 hours of bear viewing, 2.5 hours' flight) Times are approximate and are for general planning only.




Katmai Bear Viewing - 8-10 Hour Platform Viewing: \$1,495 per person

The federally-protected Katmai National Park and Preserve is world famous for the largest population of Alaska brown bear viewing. Accessible only by air, this is Alaska wilderness in its rawest form. Our fly-out Katmai bear viewing adventure takes you to Brooks Falls, where three bear viewing platforms connected by elevated boardwalks allow for close, unobstructed and extraordinary bear viewing in Katmai National Park. In July, lured by spawning salmon, as many as fifty bears can be seen at once along the 1.5-mile Brooks River. Katmai bear viewing at Brooks Falls is self-guided, but Katmai National Park Rangers provide an initial briefing upon arrival and are available for questions. An on-site wait list for the Lower River bear viewing platform may be implemented when visitation reaches capacity, to ensure quality bear viewing. Katmai is also home to the famed Valley of Ten Thousand Smokes – a forty square mile, 100 to 700-foot-deep ash flow deposited by Novarupta Volcano in 1912.

- Two to three-hour scenic flightseeing tour from Anchorage
- Katmai bear viewing at Brooks Falls watch them catch jumping salmon!
- Wildlife watching on return flight for beluga whales, moose and Dall sheep
- A window seat and 2-way headset; ask your pilot questions!
